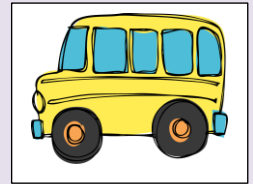

In the Garden 2022 No. 9

It is so nice to read accolades for nature. I saw this on Facebook from the Slovenian Consulate of South Australia on May 20th, 2022. They paid homage to the BEE in gratitude as they are the hardest working beings on Earth.

On this World BEE Day. The Bee lives less than 40 days and is the hardest working creature known... Facts I found out are there are three designated roles, Queen, Drone and Worker Bees. The drone's sole purpose is to fertilise the Queen, and they live only a few days after doing so. The Queen, once fertilized, lays up to 2,000 eggs each day. The Worker Bees, who are Female, make up the majority of 90% and are responsible for everything else, like gathering nectar, guarding the Hive, caring for the Queen and Larvae, keeping the Hive clean and producing Honey.

Every Honeybee can produce a tablespoon of Honey in its lifetime. To make 9.56 oz. of honey, 683 bees will fly roughly 32,550 miles to gather 5.93 lbs of nectar from about 1,185,000 flowers. They can fly up to 12 m.p.h. On every foraging trip a Bee will visit 500 to 700 flowers to collect nectar. Some are Nurses, others are Foragers who gather nectar to make honey and visit 500 to 700 flowers to collect nectar.

Collectively, Honeybees are able to achieve an incredible level of sophistication, especially considering their brains are only the size of a sesame seed. How wonderful is that! When you are in a garden with bees, keep your arms still, let the bees look at you and remain calm. If you wave your arms around and hit one, then they will sting you.

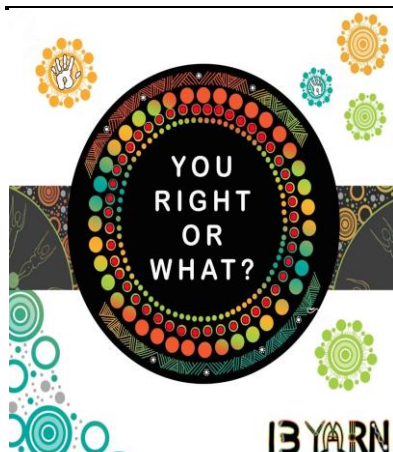

Open for business: WRC draft plan aims for growth

REDUCED rates for the majority of vacant land, businesses and industries – along with a new rate rebate to stimulate local growth – feature in Wakefield Regional Council’s proposed plans for 2022/23. Most vacant land rates will be almost halved under the proposed plan as a lever to entice developers to the region, while a strategic rate rebate of up to 100% for up to 10 years will also be on offer for the first time to encourage investment, facilitate residential development and support existing businesses and industries to thrive and expand.

Council last night endorsed its draft 2022/23 Annual Community Plan & Budget for community consultation and Mayor Rodney Reid said significant investment in projects to activate the region and renew community assets would also take centre stage. “Guided by our Wakefield 2030 Community Plan, we are proposing to invest in a number of exciting projects in 2022/23 – including \$1M to kickstart transformation of Port Wakefield into a tourism and lifestyle destination,” Mayor Reid said. “The Port Wakefield Master Plan is arguably the most exciting project ever undertaken by Council and we have agreed to allocate \$500,000 on top of another \$500,000 from the Federal Government’s Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program in 2022/23.”

The draft budget includes \$9.55M of capital works to deliver Wakefield 2030 priority projects, including \$4.98M for renewing roads, footpaths, kerbs and water tables across the region. Council’s recently adopted Rating Policy, which includes a new model for calculating rates, will be applied for the first time in 2022/23. The new approach aims to balance rates more evenly across different categories of land use and encourage growth and development.

“In the year ahead, we are forecasting significant average rate decreases for vacant landholders (reduction of 43%), commercial businesses (reduction of 7%) and industries (reduction of 17%),” Mayor Reid said. “One of the main aims of our new Rating Policy is to reflect our Wakefield 2030 strategies around opening the region to business, supporting existing businesses to thrive and expand and enticing new developers to the area, so this rate relief will be a great first step, while the strategic rate rebate for industry, business and developers will ultimately benefit the whole community through jobs and economic growth.”

Mayor Reid said the latest figures from the Valuer-General show capital valuations for the primary production land use category have soared on average by 24%. “Applying the new model, we are seeking to redistribute some of the rate burden across other land use categories. This allows us to keep the rate increase to an average of 8% for primary production land holders – which equates to about \$3.87 a week,” he said. “On top of that, a separate cap now applies for individual ratepayers whose annual rate increase exceeds 7% above the 5% general rate rise being proposed by Council, so there is another safety net in place for those who have had significant valuation increases. “Overall, we’re forecasting a total 5% increase in rates income to Council. Residential property owners will see an average increase of 8% - the same as primary production – or about \$1.77 a week extra on average to help fund the projects and services that benefit the community.” Mayor Reid said Council would be affected by the recent record Consumer Price Index rise and was anticipating a 4.7% increase to operating and capital costs for 2022/23.

Yesterday's News

The Chronicle 24 June 1905

POULTRY STEALING

Port Wakefield June 14



At the roll-call this morning several fowls were missing. Some of the railway staff, whilst going on duty at an early hour this morning, noticed several able-bodied hens wandering about in an aimless fashion. Mr. W. Croft, who lives at the rear of the mill, having heard an unusual commotion amongst his fowls about 2 a.m. started investigations shortly after daylight, and discovered that he was four birds short of his tally of the previous evening.

Other fowlhouses in the town bore strong evidence of having been forcibly entered during the night and some of the inmates had gone. Mr. Croft acquainted Mounted Constable Jones of his loss, and shortly afterwards the constable secured the missing birds in the hold of the ketch Malcom. One had passed in its checks. All the birds, including a pigeon, were secured and placed in a receptacle at the back of the police cells, where the fowls and their owners identified each other.

The police arrested, on suspicion, a youth named Henry McGrath, aged-18 years, and on being brought before Messrs. Greenshields and Drake, he pleaded guilty, and was sent to Wallaroo for a month's hard labour.

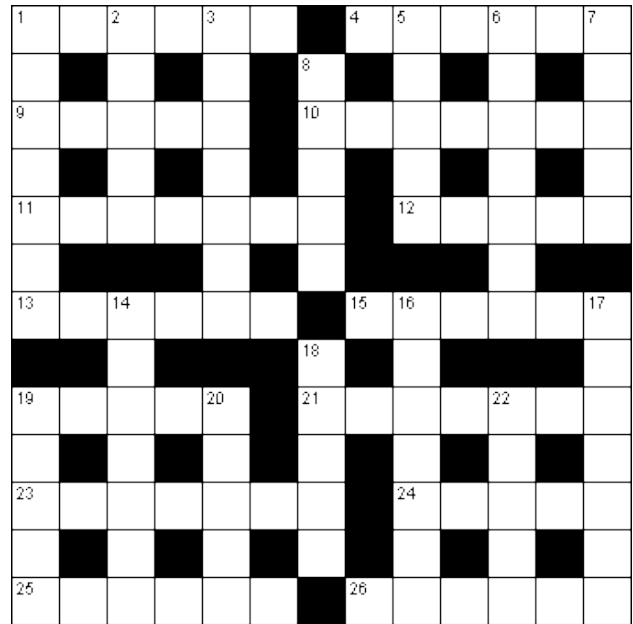
