The Wooroora Producer September 7th, 1916

A surprise party was given to Mr E. A. J. Matthews last Friday evening at his home by some of his friends. Songs and cards were indulged in, Mr Syd Humphrey presided at the organ, and Mr E. Shearer also took part. Supper was laid out ia a very tasty manner. Speeches were given by Messrs Shearer, Wickham, Humphreys, McCabe, L. Johnson and Sellen. Mr E. Matthews responded. The singing of the National Anthem brought a very enjoyable evening to a close.

While delivering fish one morning recently Mr John Black was bitten on the wrist by a dog with such severity that he was sent to the Wallaroo hospital. The dog was promptly destroyed.

The weather keeps very dry and warm, yesterday being particularly so. There is an abundance of green feed about, and towards evening the land is infested with mosquitoes of an alarming size, fitted up with the latest improvement in stings.

Two young men while out shooting last Saturday came face to face with a large brown snake, anything from four to nine feet in length. The reptile glided safely into a burrow, although there was ammunition on the ground sufficient to have blown his snakeship into the next field.

Horse-breaking is now the order of the day, and some magnificent buckjumping can be witnessed in the sandhills towards evening. So far no accidents have occurred.

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
